Cancellation Policies

If you are registered, but cannot take part for some reason, please notify Iryna Bielefeld by September 28, 2022 (at the latest). Cancellation is free of charge up to eight days prior to the opening of our conference. From day seven to day five we charge you 50 percent of the conference fee. The cancellation fee rises to 75 percent from day four to day three. On day one and two before the opening of our conference we charge you the entire conference fee in case of cancellation or no-show.

HOW TO FIND US



Tutzing is located approximately 35 km southwest of Munich on Lake Starnberg (Starnberger See).

From Munich Central Station (Hauptbahnhof): Take the urban railway S-6 (S-Bahn) or the regional train (RB) to Tutzing. At the train station in Tutzing, take the Bus 958/978 to "Klenzestraße". You will also find cabs at the front entrance of Tutzing train station. Please note our special offers for conference tickets through the Deutsche Bahn (DB) found on our Website, see contact "how to find us".



From the airport take the urban railway S-1 or S-8 to Munich Central Station and follow the instructions above.



You can also reach the Academy by foot from Tutzing train station. It takes you 20 to 30 minutes.



To reach the Academy by car, take freeway A95 from Munich via A952 to Starnberg and continue on the federal highway until you pass the town of Traubing, then take a left. At the end of the road turn right to Tutzing. The Academy is on your left shortly after passing the town sign Tutzing.

INVITATION

Race and racism are deeply complex notions in Africa and Europe historically and contemporarily, as they are in other parts of the world. For a long time, scholars have insisted that notions of racism have been exported from Europe to Africa. Yet, recent research shows a more complex development. The racial hegemony of “whiteness” and the dispossession of minorities in Africa not only preceded the Western conceptualization of race and racism but also emerged before these analytic discourses came to exist in Western Europe. Even so, there are several parallels between Africa and Europe in the themes and arguments pertaining to the nature of being racially marginalized or victimized by racism.

Our conference aims at debating similarities and differences of racial concepts in Africa and Europe. Furthermore, it analyzes the history of transfer and interconnection between the two regions. As a result, we hope for new insights in the development of the concepts of race and racism.
